Q3 2024 Recap: July - September

This past quarter has been full of exciting developments as we deepened our research and engagement across key focus areas. Here's a look at what we've accomplished, with insights from each team member.



Sachin Nandha Strengthening Partnerships in India

Sachin's travels to numerous regions across India were a defining part of Q3. From Mumbai to Kashmir and from Assam to Arunachal Pradesh, Sachin met with stakeholders on the ground, as well as political and business leaders, to reinforce the ICfS's commitment to firsthand research and relationship-building. These visits were pivotal in understanding local challenges, especially in politically sensitive regions like Jammu and Kashmir, where historic elections were held after a decade.

Sachin also formalised the ICfS's Fellowship Programme. This initiative brings together subject matter experts from various sectors to guide and mentor our research teams, ensuring that our work is both rigorous and impactful. See related articles.

Shruti KapilResearching Security Matters

Shruti spearheaded major projects this quarter, beginning with the **Manipur Security Brief**. This project involved in-depth ground research and engagement with key stakeholders in the ongoing conflict, including individuals from the Kuki, Meitei and Naga communities, security personnel and regional experts. Her brief aims to provide a well-rounded perspective on the conflict, addressing narratives that can sometimes be disconnected from the realities on the ground. Through this initiative, Shruti seeks to shed light on the complex and multifaceted nature of the Manipur situation.

Water Security Project, a long-term effort aimed at addressing India's escalating water challenges. This project seeks to counter approaches that may overlook local realities by focusing on critical, ground-level solutions. By fostering collaborations with scientists, activists and government bodies, the initiative is positioned to conduct extensive research across India, with the goal of identifying actionable solutions to ensure water sustainability from a security perspective.

Shruti visited **Jammu and Kashmir** as part of her work on monitoring the elections there. These elections are especially historic following the repeal of Article 370. This provision had given autonomy to the region in all matters apart from foreign affairs, defence and communications. By conducting in-person research, Shruti was able to assess local narratives and sentiments firsthand, gaining deeper insights into the aspirations of the region's people and the broader political implications for its future. Her presence in Jammu and Kashmir was crucial in providing a more nuanced analysis of the evolving dynamics in the area.

In September, Jade spent her time meeting our fellows, our partners in the wider community and getting to know our team and understanding more about their research. She has been working on shaping our research strategy, refining our mission, assisting with finance matters and setting the groundwork for measurable targets for the ICfS. She is also organising our **first Fellowship Roundtable** to be held in October, to help inform our 2025 research focus.

During Niti Aayog's trade mission to the UK in September, Jade represented the ICfS at a private discussion held at Rothschilds Bank. Indian officials and British business leaders discussed facilitating FDI into India for large-scale infrastructure projects, related challenges and green financing opportunities.

Pravar analysed the results of the **2024 UK General Election**, showing how Labour's landslide victory came about and how the parliamentary map might better incorporate smaller parties under a more proportionate electoral system.

Pravar has also explored whether **Citizens' Assemblies** in the UK can promote greater democratic participation. His work reflects on the success stories from local councils in England and in other countries to refine British practice. The first part of this research will be published later this year.

Nitish Rai Parwani Empowering Diasporic Communities

Nitish's research this quarter focused on the participation of diasporic communities, including Indian, Pakistani, and Bangladeshi groups, in the British general elections. His engagement with these communities and analysis of their influence on political outcomes was published in the journal *Asian Voice*.

In August, Nitish took a field trip to India, meeting with top academic institutions such as the Indian Institute of Science (IISc), the Indian Institute of Management (IIM), the National Law School of India University (NLS), the Chanakya University and the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) to explore and shape future collaborations, further strengthening the ICfS's academic partnerships.

Chloe conducted **research on the UK elections**, analysing Rishi Sunak's national service proposal and its logistical challenges, as well as the impact of faith-based manifestos on democratic integrity. She also profiled the newly elected Labour cabinet, linking their focus areas to the team's interests.

Additionally, Chloe wrote an article on systemic failures highlighted by the RG Kar Medical College tragedy in Kolkata, advocating for reforms to protect women and healthcare professionals.
